This workshop will explore the different components of a comprehensive assessment plan: assessment for, as and of learning, triangulation of information (observations, conversations, and products), achievement chart categories (knowledge/understanding, application, thinking and communication). We will also consider the different elements such as rubrics, checklists, exit tickets, learning goals, self-assessment, feedback, grades and how to bring it all together in a plan that provides multiple opportunities for students to demonstrate the full range of their learning.

We will share practical ideas and suggestions that lead us through the importance of pedagogical documentation as a way for educators to notice and name the learning and plan for next steps in collaboration with children, families, and other educators. We will explore different tools and resources as we engage in creating learning stories and provide opportunities for participants to reflect and connect about how they can immediately use these assessment and evaluation tools in the classroom, tomorrow. This is intended to be a space for co-learning, sharing best practices, hands-on professional learning experiences, and FUN! **This workshop can be tailored specifically for DECE locals.

That begins with you and your students. Their voices matter and need to be amplified. Are you interested in exploring climate change with your students? But are not quite sure how to address the topic? This workshop will take you through, step by step, how to launch an environmental inquiry with your students within the culturally responsive and relevant pedagogy framework. You will explore, through a social justice lens, local issues such as clean water and protecting green spaces and will leave the session with ready-to-go ideas that can lead to authentic, meaningful youth-led eco-action.

French	In-Person	Coding in French Class?!? Pourquoi pas?	Building students' skills for a future shaped by technology now includes teaching them how to code. Contrary to popular belief, research suggests that language aptitude, memory and reasoning play a bigger role in predicting how well someone will pick up a computer language - not their ability to crunch numbers. Second language learners are uniquely suited for learning how to program. What might this look like in the FSL classroom? Learn the key concepts and practices that make coding a valuable language tool for learning, problem solving and innovation, while gaining the confidence to "tinker" in the classroom. We will look at practical "screen-based" as well as "unplugged" strategies, tools, and resources to support educators and their students in transforming their second language learning environments.
French	In-Person	Inclusive Language in the FSL Classroom	Learn the basics of the movement behind "L'écriture Inclusive" and make your French classroom more inclusive with language that respects all genders and identities!
French	Virtual	Thriving in Core French	Is teaching Core French causing you some stress? This workshop examines some of the challenges teachers of FSL face on a daily basis and seeks to provide tools that can assist with managing the changing demands of the classroom. Strategies will be shared that encourage fun and interest while encouraging speaking in French. ICT **NEW**	In-Person	Student Podcasts – Voice & Choice: A Guide to Student-Led Podcasting	Learn about the importance of storytelling from an anti-colonial, anti-hierarchical perspective in the junior and intermediate classroom using the powerful tool of podcasting. Participants will create their own podcast episode as an oral storytelling artifact. Through this process, we will cover basic equipment setup and software used for recording and editing podcasts, as well as publication tools and sharing using self-created artwork. Participants will leave this workshop with the skills required to help learners create a class or school-wide podcast that empowers storytelling from a cultural and historical perspective while amplifying unique voices and points of view.
Language Arts	In-Person	Cultivating Critical Media Literacies	In this workshop, members will learn anti-oppressive frameworks to support learners in developing critical literacy skills. Integrating social media and popular media texts into learning practice, provides educators with many culturally sustaining pedagogical opportunities to affirm students' interests, identities, and ways of knowing. Members will reflect on our role in supporting learners to evaluate the everyday media they consume. Members will learn instructional strategies to design media integrations that empower students to critically examine issues such as power, justice, and bias. This session will engage participants in how to utilize diverse texts, democratize learning spaces and activities, empower learners to confront and challenge social injustice, and to adopt an asset-based, growth mindset about students' abilities. Participants will engage in rich and meaningful discussion as they take part in activities that incorporate the use of diverse texts and media for read aloud and shared reading. Participants will also engage in writer's notebook activities that promote maximum student engagement planning for multiple entry points for writing, culturally responsive and relevant provocations for writing, while fostering a strong and collaborative writing community. Together, we will reflect and share ideas on ways we can seek to be more culturally responsive.
Language **NEW**	In-Person	Gender Splendour!	Gender Splendour!" is a workshop about inclusive curriculum that celebrates the diversity of 2SLGBTQ+ communities, and centres justice and joy. In this workshop, participants will be supported to lead courageous conversations about gender identity and expression, homophobia and transphobia, gender stereotypes, and diverse families. Participants will leave this workshop with an extensive book list, and many ideas about how to integrate Gender Splendour! throughout the curriculum.
Language **NEW**	In-Person	Supporting and Affirming 2SLGBTQ+ Identities	In this workshop, educators will deepen their understanding of the policies, procedures, and laws that oblige educators to teach and affirm 2SLGBTQ+ students' intersectional identities. Participants will have an opportunity to discuss 2SLGBTQ+ issues such as competing rights. Using a variety of layered texts, participants will explore practical strategies to affirm intersectional 2SLGBTQ+ identities. Presenters will also be sharing all the curricular areas in which 2SLGBTQ+ identities are included from grades 1-8.

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Mathematics	In-Person	The Power of Differentiation in the Mathematics Classroom	Educators that are effective at differentiation use every moment in the day and every day in the classroom to find out about how their classroom can work more effectively for all learners. This workshop will help enhance educators' confidence and skills to create a classroom where all learners feel they are welcome and contributors in the mathematics classroom. Differentiation is not something that is done separately but planned within instruction. Therefore, educators will be involved in the learning during this workshop to support their focus on use of practices in their own classrooms. By the end of this session, educators should feel they are on their way to creating a mathematics classroom that better suits all their learners.
Mathematics	In-Person	Purposeful Use of Technology in Math Class. What Does That Look Like?	Are you interested in incorporating technology into your K-5 math classroom but not sure where to start? Do you want to help your students make their thinking visible in math class but not sure how? Have you ever thought about using technology for instruction or assessment? If you have asked yourself any of these questions, this session might be for you! Come play, explore, and immerse yourself in a teacher-created resource with all kinds of information at your fingertips! All applications (apps) serve a purpose, and it is our job as teachers to encourage the 'purposeful use' of technology in the math classroom, and at the same time, ensure that curriculum connections are being made. However, all apps are not created equally! In this session, you will learn that there are apps that serve as tools, are best for practice of skills, and those that support students to create or communicate their thinking. You will also deepen your pedagogical understanding of the use of technology as intentional instruction based on evidence of student learning and develop an understanding of technology and assessment for learning practices. Leave with full access to the resource, which includes a list of applications and 'how to' pages; learning with technology ideas; curriculum connections; student samples; lesson examples; and resources for assessment.
